Regulations for Exhibitors

- 1. Entries are open to: i) fully paid up members of the Gardening Club. ii) clubs based in the village. iii) residents living within the parish of Kingston Bagpuize with Southmoor. Except where otherwise stated.
- Entries for children's classes 85 to 91 are open to all children 14 and under on the day of the show, and are not restricted to children of fully paid up members of the Gardening Club or residents living within the parish of Kingston Bagpuize with Southmoor.
- 3. Children 14 and under may enter any class in the schedule; please note that age will not be taken into consideration when judging any of the classes except classes 85 to 90.
- 4. All floral, vegetable and fruit exhibits shall be from plants which have been grown by the exhibitor for at least two months immediately preceding the Show, except in the flower arrangement classes and where stated otherwise in the schedule. The Committee reserves the right to inspect the gardens or plot of any exhibitor.
- 5. Completed entry forms (1 form per person, whether or not adult or child), accompanied by the correct fees (25p per class, children free) should be received by the Show Secretary at the address stated on the entry form by 8pm on the Thursday prior to the Show. No further entries will be accepted after this time.
- 6. The Committee cannot accept responsibility for exhibits, plates, dishes, vases, etc provided by the exhibitor. All exhibits must be removed immediately after the show closes. The committee reserves the right to dispose of unclaimed items.
- 7. Only one entry in each class will be permitted from any one exhibitor unless otherwise stated.
- 8. Judges will be appointed by the Committee and the Judges' decisions will be final.
- Judging will be in accordance with the Schedule. Judges shall have the right to reduce or withhold awards according to the standard or number of exhibits in any of the classes.
- 10. Only Stewards appointed by the Committee will be permitted to enter the hall during the judging of the exhibits.
- 11. All exhibits must be staged between 9.00am and 10.30am on the morning of the Show. No exhibits will be allowed in after this time and exhibitors must leave the hall to allow judging to commence.
- 12. Points to be awarded for each class as follows:

1st 5 Points
2nd 3 Points
3rd 2 Points
Highly Commended 1 Point

Exception - class 48, Collection of 4 vegetables, where the points awarded will be: 1st - 10 points; 2nd - 6 points; 3rd - 4 points, Highly Commended – 2 points

These tips for showing and advice have been adapted from the Royal Horticultural Society Show Handbook and are intended to help the exhibitor display their produce consistently and to the best effect.

- 1. All flowers should be exhibited in a clean vase with variety stated if possible. Blooms should be arranged to face forwards.
- 2. Roses should be clean and displayed complete with leaves.
- 3. Plants should be in a tidy condition with dead leaves or dead blooms removed. Pots should be clean and tidy.
- 4. Onions, shallots and garlic should be of uniform size, not be skinned and displayed on sand or grit. Roots trimmed and top tied with variety named if known.
- 5. Beetroot and carrots should be of uniform size, exhibited in a clean condition with 2 inch top and complete root.
- 6. Potatoes should be clean and displayed on a plate with variety named if known.
- 7. Tomatoes, displayed with calyx, be of uniform size and should not have been washed or polished and have natural bloom intact. Variety named if known.
- 8. Tomatoes mini, one truss with the majority of fruits ripe and variety named if known.
- 9. Beans, points will be awarded for freshness i.e. snap not bend and for uniformity of size.
- 10. Tomatoes, displayed with calyx, should not have been washed or polished and have natural bloom intact. Varieties named if known. Any varieties can be included in the bowl.
- 11. Cucumber displayed with stalks. Points will be awarded for uniformity and variety should be named if known.
- 12. Chilli peppers should be of uniform size, bright colour, not have been washed or polished and have natural bloom. Variety named if known.
- 13. Courgette maximum 7 inches long with stalks attached and uniform in colour, not have been washed or polished have natural bloom and variety named if known.
- 14. Vegetable should be clean and well-presented and variety named if known.
- 15. Points will be awarded for neatness of display and freshness of herbs.
- 16. Vegetables should be clean with foliage and roots intact.
- 17. Mixed vegetables in a trug or basket, points will be awarded for attractiveness of exhibit and variety of contents.
- 18. Apples, pears and stoned fruit should all have stalks, but not leaves, be separate and should not have been washed or polished and have natural bloom with variety named.
- 19. Raspberries should be separate, displayed on a plate complete with stalk, be of bright colour (ripe) and have variety named if known.
- 20. Bowl of mixed fruit, points will be awarded for attractiveness of exhibit and variety of contents.
- 21. Preserves to be presented in a standard sized clean jam jar and neatly labelled and dated.
- 22. Fruit liqueur to be presented in a clear glass bottle, neatly labelled and dated.
- 23. Traditional Victoria sandwich has a raspberry jam filling. No other fillings should be used.
- 24. This can be savoury or sweet. It is important to note what it is "free from". You may also state what it includes instead. Points will be awarded for taste, the judge will consider how it compares as an alternative to "non-free from" versions.
